Minutes of the Active Transportation Advisory Committee Meeting

November 18, 2024, 2:00 PM Video Conference

1. CALL TO ORDER

S. Maki, Director of Engineering & Operations, acknowledged with respect and gratitude that the City of Pitt Meadows is located on the traditional, unceded territory of dicay (Katzie) First Nation who were stewards of this land since time immemorial.

The meeting was called to order at 2:02 PM.

2. LATE ITEMS

None.

3. <u>APPROVAL OF AGENDA</u>

There was general consent amongst the Committee to approve the November 18, 2024 Active Transportation Advisory Committee agenda as circulated.

4. ADOPTION OF MINUTES

There was general consent amongst the Committee to approve the minutes from the July 22, 2024 Active Transportation Advisory Committee meeting as circulated.

5. <u>NEW BUSINESS</u>

5.1 Grants Update

E. Borromeo, Engineering Technician, & S. Maki, Director of Engineering & Operations, provided a brief update on active transportation grants received and applied for by the City forming a part of the minutes as **Attachment 1**.

The Committee participated in a discussion with the following main themes noted:

• A question was raised around the reasoning for the high cost estimate for the project at Pitt Meadows Athletic Park [Bonson Road] pedestrian crossing including the Rapid Flashing Beacon (*Staff mentioned that curb extensions are included in the scope, and the crosswalk and bus stop may need to be relocated, resulting in a higher cost estimate*).

5.2 Harris Road Complete Street Feasibility Study [HRCSFS] - Update

S. Maki, Director of Engineering & Operations, provided a verbal update on the Harris Road Complete Street Feasibility Study. Some of the highlights included:

- Aplin Martin Consultants has been engaged to complete the Harris Road Complete Street Feasibility Study [HRCSFS];
- Past data collection and reports have been shared with the consultant;
- Additional traffic data will be collected to fill in gaps in the existing data;
- A topographical survey is being completed for the whole corridor within the next week;

- Over the next few months, up to five (5) high level concepts are to be created, which will be reviewed and narrowed down to three (3) options that will be brought back to this Committee in March 2025 for feedback, as well as engagement with the public on the design options; and
- Staff are looking to complete the project before 2025 business planning, so it can be considered for future priorities and capital budget.

The Committee participated in a discussion with the following main themes noted:

- The request was made for more information around what concepts the Committee could expect to review (*Staff confirmed that typically conceptual drawings would include a cross-section of the road, what changes could be made throughout the length of Harris Road within the existing right-of-way, what facilities could be accommodated (such as MUP, protected bike lane, removal of medias, etc), and how the complete street transitions at bus stops and intersections*);
- The question was raised whether the concepts would include cost estimates (Staff confirmed that order of magnitude would be included in the five options. The three concepts that will be provided for feedback would include high level details and lifecycle cost estimates; from there, after receiving Committee and resident feedback, the concepts and estimates will be refined).
- A question was raised around how the HRCSFS would impact the potential of a Harris Road underpass/overpass (*The design concepts would include both scenarios (options supporting the grade separation and options at-grade)*. Staff noted this is only one section of the road and the scope of this project runs from Fraser Way to Lougheed Highway. Once the study is complete and if endorsed by Council, the project would likely be phased in over time and with supporting grants);
- The question was raised whether a cycling track would be included in the concepts (*Staff confirmed a variety of options will be explored (MUP, protected bike lane, other and that it is important to meet current design guidelines further noting no options have been eliminated at this time*);
- The 2012 Pedestrian and Cycling Master Plan and 2014 Transportation Master Plan discussed potential connections coming into play which

could lead to the reduction of lanes on Harris Road and what that meant (Staff explained that this study could have been speaking to the McTavish Road Connector, the at grade crossing, or possibly how other local roads could have been used and supported if the number of vehicles lanes on Harris Rd were reduced. Given that Harris Rd is the City's main urban arterial, it is unlikely that the vehicle travel lanes would be reduced given growth and increased development anticipated along the corridor); and

• The question was raised whether the Ministry of Transportation & Infrastructure project at Lougheed Highway & Harris Road was going to be considered during this project (*Staff confirmed that yes, the project has been flagged in order to integrate with the HRCSFS project*).

5.3 E-Scooter Update

S. Maki, Director of Engineering & Operations, provided a verbal update on escooters in the community and staff's next steps. Some of the highlights included:

- The RCMP, Staff, and Mayor and CAO have met to discuss the concerns around e-scooters and how to increase awareness and education;
- Following up on the previous e-scooter and e-bike update to ATAC years ago, Staff will research outcomes of various pilot projects and lessons learned. Staff also noted that there are different types and speeds of escooters, e-bikes, and motorcycles and different regulations for each, which leads to confusion;
- Key messaging will be drafted and shared with the community and social media platforms in 2025's Active Transportation Campaign that typically runs April September;
- RCMP has been discussing and collaborating with School District 42 regarding e-scooters and enforcement messaging; and
- The works associated with e-scooters is included in 2025 business plan being presented next week at Council, and within staff's 2025 work plan.

The Committee participated in a discussion with the following main themes noted:

- The question was raised around whether there were any Provincial efforts being made to add Provincial legislation around e-scooters (*Staff explained that the Motor Vehicle Act outlines what is allowed on roadways, but there is opportunity for Cities to be a part of the Province's pilot program but nothing beyond that at this point and that it is still a relatively new topic*);
- A comment was made noting that increased education and awareness needs to continue on this topic;
- The committee asked about ICBC involvement in this issue. It was mentioned that ICBC has expressed their position on e-scooters and that it doesn't involve them. Insurance confusion was also highlighted;
- The recommendation was made that the Federal and Provincial government should be developing legislation around this mode of transportation, which would allow for infractions to be enforceable; and
- A question was asked whether e-scooters was something that was discussed at UBCM this past year (*Council liaisons mentioned that they didn't recall it*).

5.4 Update on ATAC Project Priorities List

S. Maki, Director of Engineering & Operations, provided an update on the ATAC Project Priorities List.

The Committee participated in a discussion with the following main themes noted:

• A question was raised around Item 59 requesting more information around this item and its history (*Staff explained that this item had been brought forward by a previous ATAC member and identified a few locations on various dikes/trails where gates are currently too narrow for a wheelchair/mobility device to gain access and that accessibility modifications could be made*);

- A question was raised around whether item 59 would include re-surface (Staff mentioned that there is only \$10k allotted to this item currently, and beyond very localized re-surfacing (such as Ferryslip Rd's gate entrance) further scope is not included at this time);
- A suggestions was made to relocate a jersey barrier and pack the gravel at the NW corner of Baynes Road and Airport Way Baynes (Staff confirmed previous dialogue on this item and that they would look into this location);
- Item 79 the Multi Use Connection on Harris Road at Fieldstone and Airport Trail was identified as an important connection that is currently a gap in the network (*Staff mentioned this would be looked at in the HRCSFP and that any changes would likely be phased in with implementation of that project in future years*); and
- A questions was raised around Item 76 and whether the bylaw revisions will include the recommendations from the new Active Transportation Plan (*Staff confirmed that there are many updates required to the subdivision bylaw, many of them outside of active transportation, but that the recommendations in the ATP and updated BC Active Transportation Guidelines (such as sidewalk width, and road cross-sections, tactile pads, etc) would be considered within the full bylaw update that will be completed in 2025*).

5.5 Update on ATAC Action Item Tracker

S. Maki, Director of Engineering & Operations, provided an update on the ATAC Action Item Tracker and forms part of the minutes in **Attachment 2.**

The Committee participated in a discussion with the following main themes noted:

• A question was raised around where people could see information about the ATAC advertising campaigns (*Staff confirmed these campaigns are drafted internally and shared through social media on the City's various platforms, but a past version was shared with ATAC earlier this year. Staff further confirmed that two recent updates were around health and climate, as well as the regulations around the new passing legislation*).

6. <u>ROUNDTABLE</u>

The Committee participated in a roundtable discussion. There were no formal motions put forward. Items regarding staff action and takeaways have been added to the Action Item Tracker.

7. <u>ADJOURNMENT</u>

The meeting was adjourned at 3:31 PM.

The next *Active Transportation Advisory Committee* meeting will be scheduled for a Monday in March 2025 at 2:00 PM *with the specific date to be determined in January 2025.*
